The City Commission met on this date February 26, 2026 at 6:00 P.M. at the Wewahitchka Senior/Community Building, 314 N. 3rd St, Wewahitchka, Florida. **Mayor Gaskin** called the meeting to order, asked **Sherrif Mike Harrison** to lead a prayer, and everyone said the Pledge of Allegiance.

**Approval of Agenda**

**Commissioner Pettis** made a motion to approve the agenda. **Commissioner Paul** seconded the motion. Motion carried 5-0.

**Approval of Minutes**

After review, **Commissioner Paul** made a motion to approve Regular Meeting 1.29.26 and special meeting 2.19.26 minutes. **Commissioner Pettis** seconded the motion. Motion carried 5-0.

**Agenda Items**

- 1. Bid 2026-0106 – Storm Water Repair Project M0163 – City Engineer Hunter Baumgardner** stated we received, reviewed, tabulated, and checked references on all the bids. Everything

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checks out with CBL, and we recommend the award go the low bidder Chapel Branch and Lagniappe for \$1,590,184.00.

Following discussion **Commissioner Fisher** made a motion to award Bid 2026-0106 – Storm Water Repair Project M0163 to Chapel Branch and Lagniappe for \$1,590,184.00. **Commissioner Cox** seconded the motion. Motion carried 5-0.

- 2. Amanda Lake - Limited Variance Request** – **Mrs. Amanda Lake** stated that some of the public have been asking for a biergarten during the rodeo's and requested permission for a limited variance to allow alcoholic beverages (draft only) at the park during the two rodeos.

Following discussion, the board tabled the request until City **Attorney Michelle Jordan** can review the request and ordinance prior to the board making a decision

- 3. Gulf County Senior Program/Wewa Senior Building** – **Eddie Fields** Director of Gulf County Senior Citizens Association, stated he had been invited to discuss the issues and concerns with the senior program in Wewa. He stated he invited **Lisa Bretz** and her staff with Advantage Aging Solutions to help address the concerns.

**Mrs. Bretz** addressed the board stating that **Mr. Fields** had invited her to come and explain the program in more detail and answer questions. She explained that their agency is the designated area agency on aging and are responsible for centers in 14 counties in Florida. She stated that Gulf County Senior Citizens Association has been a long standing partner with their agency. In 2021 they had bid on their programs, however they were not able to move along in the process because they had two fatal flaws in their grant applications, so the contract was awarded to Liberty County Senior Citizens Association. So Liberty County Senior Citizens Association is the lead contractor that is serving Gulf County along with Gulf County Senior Citizens Association.

**Mrs. Bretz** stated there is about \$126,000.00 allocated to serve all of Gulf County. The budget is established by Liberty County Senior Citizens Association in consultation with the executive director of Gulf County to determine what services can be delivered with the funding that they receive. The way the funding operates is that each county has a specific allotment of the funds received from elder affairs that is formula based.

**Mrs. Bretz** stated that since they are the contract management entity, she wanted to come in person to hear the concerns about services at the senior center in Wewa and be able to help Gulf and Liberty County work through those challenges. She stated that the Director of Liberty County was unable to attend due to a personal matter.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked if he had heard correctly that Liberty County received \$126,000.00 for the Gulf County Seniors. **Mrs. Bretz** clarified that Liberty County has subcontracted with the Gulf County Senior Citizens for the \$126,000.00.

**Mrs. Bretz** stated she would bring her CFO up to help explain. **CFO David Gouse** introduced himself and stated that the first point he's like to clarify is that this not a check that is automatically delivered, it is on a reimbursement basis as units of service are delivered. All of the risk is not on the state or the feds it is all on the local service provider. Working with the county and local governments, they establish meal sites and cover infrastructure costs. **Mr. Gouse** stated that Gulf County's senior program existed prior to the Older American's Act. The Older American's Act funding that is funding your area is based on a population formula and

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out of a total 4.3 million dollars that is available to a 14-county area, \$126,000.00 was designated to Gulf County. The recipient of the funding only earn the revenue once they incur the cost of service delivery. **Mr. Gouse** reiterated that this is not guaranteed funding that Eddie goes forth and creates a budget and receives the funds. There is a carefully planned schedule of services that can only be drawn down by delivering the units of service.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked if that is a federal or state program? **Mr. Gouse** stated the Older American's Act is a 100% federal program. **Mr. Gouse** explained that from the total funding that comes to the agency there is a state portion of the funds that are for homebound clients. The part that we are talking about is for the meal congregate sites that is funded through the Older American's Act. **Mr. Gouse** also explained that the Older American's Act requires that there must be one congregate meal site per county. He stated that it's a testament to Gulf County that they have been able to operate 2 meal sites until now, but the problem is not unique to Gulf County either, there are many other counties that are having the same issue. The problem is that the cost of doing business is going up faster than the amount of government funding being put on the table. So what is happening is locally decisions are being made to use those budgeted funds to serve as many seniors as possible, so what that means is that your county might be able to operate 2 meal sites.

**Mrs. Bretz** stated that what has allowed Gulf County to have 2 meal sites is through the generosity of the City for providing the building and covering the utilities, however that is not enough to offset the costs anymore. She stated that there is an average of 5 clients who participate in the meal program here, in addition to 11 to 15 who might come to participate in Bingo and activities. **Mrs. Bretz** went on to explain that they needed to have a meal site in the county seat where the most seniors could be served. South Gulf County has 33% that are eligible for service whereas Wewahitchka has 12% that are eligible by age.

**Mayor Gaskin** stated you are taking care of more than just Wewahitchka up here you are taking care of North Gulf County and that would be more than 12%. **Mrs. Bretz** stated no, Wewahitchka's demographic is 12% of Gulf County's population.

**Mayor Gaskin** said so what the people outside of the City supposed to do? **Mrs. Bretz** answered we have not denied services, we have provided access options for people to be transported free of cost through Big Bend Transit. If your seniors choose not to accept that transportation that is fine. She stated she is standing before you tonight to say that we have no intention of stopping services here at this point. **Mrs. Bretz** said it may come down to Gulf County Seniors Association having no choice other than to shut down, based on what Liberty County is able to do in balancing the budget.

**Commissioner Pettis** asked why is Liberty County controlling the funds for Gulf County? **Mrs. Bretz** explained that due to the fatal flaws in Gulf County Senior Citizens Association grant application in 2021. Liberty County was awarded the contract.

**City Parks and Rec Director David Paul** asked who was in charge of Gulf County Senior Citizens Association in 2021. **Mrs. Bretz** stated **Mr. Fields** was, he had just taken over the program. **Mrs. Bretz** stated that it was his predecessor who established the fatal flaws in the application.

**Mr. Gouse** clarified that the funds are not going to Liberty County. They are privatized agencies that receive the funding and everything is done through an RFP for award the contracts.

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**Mrs. Bretz** stated that Liberty County Seniors Association has the contract for Liberty, Gulf and Franklin Counties and that each county has a separate allocation and recording system for each county's allocated funding. The records are monitored frequently to ensure everything is recorded correctly.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked if the 2024 990 had been filed for the Gulf County Senior Citizens Association? Someone in the public audience replied yes it has. **Mayor Gaskin** stated he would like to look at it.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked if it is correct that Gulf County provides \$60,000.00 that the City of Port St. Joe provides about \$17,000.00, since they don't provide a building? **Mr. Fields** stated yes. **Mayor Gaskin** stated he didn't see that on the 2023 taxes and that is revenue that should have been accounted for.

**Mr. Fields** stated that he started with the program in February of 2022 and prior to that there was no computerized system. Now they have a shared file to make sure they have everything in there and all funds are accounted for. He stated that Tammy is their fiscal officer and they would make sure that all of it is provided to the board if they would like.

**Mayor Gaskin** stated that they would like to see the 2024 990 and to please get it to City Manager Michael Gortman.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked **Mr. Fields** what was his plan for the Wewa center? The letter that you gave the City stated that you were temporarily going to shut this facility down.

**Mr. Fields** stated that temporary closure was based on the accounting firm telling him what they were going to look like if they didn't do some changes. The shutdown was going to be temporary to do some restructuring. However, after speaking with commissioners and Rep. Shoaf's office the center remained opened.

Discussion followed regarding the building being locked and **Mr. Fields'** employee not having access to it. It was noted that the City was not involved in that issue.

**Mr. Fields** stated that he didn't want to shut the center down and he is concerned about the people. He wanted to restructure to make it better.

**Mrs. Bretz** stated that there have been about 3 times that their agency and Liberty County, being the contract holder have recommended there only be one meal site, but **Mr. Fields** wanted to keep this location going.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked **City Clerk Rachel Jackson** if she could interject on that? Asking if that is what she heard from Liberty County? **City Clerk Rachel Jackson** stated that was not what she heard from **Stormy Johnson** who is the Director of Liberty County. **City Clerk Jackson** stated that upon hearing about the closure through 3<sup>rd</sup> parties and social media she called and spoke to **Mrs. Johnson** to find out what was going on. **Mrs. Johnson** stated that she had only just learned about the closure and had not initiated it and that she was going to call **Mr. Fields** to find out the details.

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**Commissioner Pettis** stated that he felt that shutting down the Wewa center was not an option and that if they are going to shut the center down, we need adequate notice. We received notice of Friday afternoon at about 1:30 which didn't allow anytime to prepare or make plans. He stated he felt that was a bad way of doing business and he didn't think shutting the center down is an option. If Gulf County Senior Citizens Association can't keep it open we need ample time for the City to do something.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked how many people here are seniors that participate in the program? 22 seniors stood to say they participated in the program.

**Mayor Gaskin** asked **Mr. Fields** if the financial burden they were having with keeping the center open was because of the personnel that it takes to run the program up here? He said yes. **Mayor Gaskin** said he had a solution if the people don't mind. He stated that **Mr. Fields** could have the people who wanted to participate in the program transported to Port St. Joe and turn the building back over to the City of Wewahitchka. The City would keep the building open and available for activities during the same hours as normal for those who don't wish to go to Port St. Joe. **Mayor Gaskin** stated that should solve the problem, and that he has talked to numerous people who attend and said they don't attend for the meals they come to socialize and for the activities because the food is terrible. **Mrs. Bretz** attested to the food not being good and explained that they have to bid out for a food vendor and that was who won the bid.

**Mr. Fields** introduced **Carmen Block** Older American's Act Coordinator. He stated she has the list of people who actually come to the site. He stated he saw a lot of hands go up that he doesn't recognize. **Mrs. Block** stated that some of the people who raised their hands are not actual clients. **Mrs. Block** said she does the assessments for the Port St. Joe clients and **Mrs. Majorie** does the assessments in Wewa. There are only 21 clients in Wewa. City Parks & Rec Director David Paul said that there were 22 counted, so it was one person over.

**Mrs. Block** explained that the program requires that a client must attend 4 times per month to stay on the list. She said a lot of people aren't able to attend 4 times a month or just come occasionally for Bingo or Karaoke, but per our agreement with the state they have to be here 4 times per month to be in the program. She had to take anyone off of the list who don't attend at least 4 times a month.

**Mrs. Bretz** interjected that their records show there are 21 participants in the program and that on average 5-15 per day participants are receiving meals.

**Commissioner Fisher** asked **Mrs. Bretz** how long they had been over the Gulf County Senior Citizens Program? She stated over 40 years. **Commissioner Fisher** asked so you were here whenever **Mr. Stokoe** and **Mr. Shultz** were over the program? She stated yes. **Commissioner Fisher** stated that it seems like there were no problems until the current management took over. He said nothing against you, **Mr. Fields**, but someone needs to get to the root of the problem.

**Mayor Gaskin** said we need to find a solution for the issue. Following further discussion of finances, tax filings, and termination of the lease agreement, **Mayor Gaskin** polled each commissioner's opinion on the matter:

**Commissioner Cox** – stated he needed more information to have an opinion.

**Commissioner Paul** – stated there is a lot we don't know yet, and also felt he needed more information

**Commissioner Pettis** – stated that our citizens have to be taken care of. He stated that he would probably have been of the opinion that he needed more information, but after the program being shut down at 1:30 on Friday afternoon with no notice and it taking him 2 additional hours to talk with Mr. Fields and get the center re-opened and we have our citizens not knowing if they were going to have meals on Monday. **Commissioner Pettis** said he felt that the City should take over the building, because he is afraid we will be in that position again.

**Commissioner Fisher** – stated there is a lot he could say, but there is a problem in this county that needs to be solved. **Commissioner Fisher** suggested scheduling a workshop to discuss more about feeding the seniors. **Commissioner Fisher** said there is a club in this town that will help out.

**Mayor Gaskin** – stated he felt **Mr. Fields** should turn the keys of the building over to the City.

Following further discussion **Commissioner Pettis** made a motion to terminate the lease agreement with the Gulf County Seniors Association on the building. **Commissioner Fisher** seconded the motion. Motion carried 5-0.

Discussion followed regarding **Mr. Field's** getting Gulf County Senior Citizens Association's property. **Mayor Gaskin** stated that **Parks & Rec Director David Paul** would be onsite Monday at 8:00 am to let them in to get their belongings.

**Mayor Gaskin** stated that the building will be open 8:00 am -1:00 pm for the seniors' activities.

**Mrs. Bretz** stated that Big Bend Transit would be available for transportation for any senior who wanted to go to Port St. Joe.

4. **Resolution 2026-1224R-Online Advertising** - **City Clerk Rachel Jackson** explained that the resolution would allow the City to advertise online instead of through the newspaper for legal notices since the cost of advertising has gotten so expensive. She explained that the City has partnered with Gulf County to use the Civic Plus platform for online advertising.

Following discussion, **Mayor Gaskin**, asked **City Clerk Rachel Jackson** to read by title Resolution 2026-1224R. **City Clerk Rachel Jackson** read by title:

**RESOLUTION NO. 2026-1224R**

**A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF WEWAHITCHKA, FLORIDA, APPROVING THE USE OF A PUBLICLY ACCESSIBLE WEBSITE FOR THE PUBLICATION OF LEGALLY REQUIRED ADVERTISEMENTS AND PUBLIC NOTICES PURSUANT TO SECTION 50.0311, FLORIDA STATUTES; MAKING LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS REGARDING INTERNET ACCESSIBILITY WITHIN THE CITY AND COST EFFECTIVENESS; ESTABLISHING REGISTRY PROCEDURES FOR DIRECT NOTIFICATION; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

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Following reading, **Commissioner Cox** made a motion to approve Resolution 2026-1224R– Online Advertising. **Commissioner Paul** seconded the motion. Motion carried 4-0, as **Mayor Gaskin** had to step away from the meeting momentarily.

**5. M0118-Waste Water Project Amendment 2 – City Clerk Rachel Jackson** discussed the amendment to the waste water project. Explaining that Florida Commerce has allowed for an additional \$1,000,000.00 to be added to the grant for design and surveys for the sewer line project that would assist the city in getting the sewer off of the river.

**City Engineer Hunter Baumgardner**, explained that he and **City Engineer Jack Husband** went to meet with Florida Commerce about why the City didn't receive any awards on 23-24 storm grants. They found that the funds were allocated to the areas with the most damage. They also discussed the Hurricane Michael grants that the city has outstanding and they said that there was some flexibility with the funds and getting doing the designs for getting the sewer off of the river would fall into the scope of work without having to go through another environmental review. Florida Commerce liked the idea and allocated another 1,000,000.00 to get the designs ready.

Following discussion **Commissioner Fisher** made a motion to approve the M0118 Waste Water Project Amendment 2 upon receiving the final draft from Florida Commerce. **Commissioner Pettis** seconded the motion. Motion carried 5-0.

### Public Recognition

**Kellard Jansen** – discussed the federally funded contract and asked about **Mr. Fields** taking records out of the office. **Mayor Gaskin** explained that they are not City records and we are not getting them.

**Rev. Teresa Howard**, United Methodist Church pastor – asking about getting Renece Gainer paid. **Mayor Gaskin** stated we did not say that, we're not saying that we won't but we haven't gotten that figured out at this time. **Rev. Howard** stated that tomorrow the Karaoke group will provide lunch for the seniors, and on Monday The Hitch will be providing lunch for them.

**Rev Howard**, said I just want to say personally, I have worked closely with Renece and she has spent a lot of time with **Eddie Fields**, she stated that there is a lot more behind this than anyone can fathom. It has gotten down to bullying and accusing of embezzlement. She stated her take on the situation is that there is a lot of money movement and his biggest concern is money. **Rev. Howard** stated the only time when **Eddie Fields** shows his face in this senior center is when we have a holiday lunch. **Rev Howard** said she thinks the board has done a very good thing here and we will all pull together and make sure the seniors have programs 5 days a week.

**Katie Cook** – stated she volunteers with the seniors and has been absent for some time while she has been getting a degree in IT. She graduates in 9 days and would like to come back.

**Lisa Reneau** – resident at 126 E Reid Avenue - provided the copy of the 2024 taxes, stated she put a little note on them showing that there was approximately \$154,000.00 received on December 30, 2023 that was not in 2024 tax return.

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Proposed that we could become our own entity. **Mayor Gaskin** said for right now just keeping the building open and serving our seniors is the priority. **Mrs. Reneau** presented and discussed a petition and statements from the seniors and gave copies of them to **City Manager Michael Gortman**. She thanked the board for the decisions that they made.

**Renece Gainer** presented a notarized letter stating she does not have karaoke money. She stated she had been accused of a lot of wrong things and she wanted to make sure that everyone knows that she doesn't have any of that. She also stated that she only wanted the office locked because she was being accused of a lot of false things and she didn't want him going in there and setting her up.

**Patty Fisher** – GFWC Wewahitchka Womens Club will help in any way and would like a representative at the workshop

**Bill Daniels** – stated he was born and raised here, joined the military and came back to Wewa. He stated that we need all seniors involved; there are seniors out there who don't even know about the program. **Mr. Daniels** stated we are missing leadership.

**Engineer Baumgardner** presented and discussed a task order for the sewer transmission line on the waste water project M0118.

Following discussion, **Commissioner Fisher** made a motion to approve the task order for the sewer transmission line on waste water project M0118 contingent on execution of the amendment by Florida Commerce. **Commissioner Cox** seconded the motion. Motion carried 5-0.

**Engineer Hunter Baumgardner** stated that we applied for an FDEP Resiliency grant to do a vulnerability assessment that will be required to get future grants for projects. We were awarded 350,000.00 and Rachel will be bringing that agreement when we receive it.

**Gulf County Commissioner Jack Husband** – Stated Blake Rish is doing assessment on all parks to get a baseline on where everything is they asked him to assess TL James also. **Commissioner Husband** said he believes that Dixie Youth is looking to try to have a baseball tournament in 2 years at TL James and Blake is looking into prices for fixing fence and the pickleball court lights.

**Commissioner Husband** stated the county will do whatever they can to help with senior program.

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**Commissioner Paul** – asked **City Clerk Rachel Jackson** if she had heard anything from the owners of the property of the west side of the park.
